A snapshot of Year 3...




What a great autumn term already! Last half term our topic was Hola Amigos, where we learnt all about Spain! We looked at the geography of Spain, some of their famous festivals, made some Spanish food in D&T, and we even went on a virtual trip to the Sagrada Familia in Barcelona! The children really enjoyed it, and we topped it off with some Spanish greetings so they can get around if they ever visit in real life!

This half term we are learning all about the Ancient Egyptians! The children have created timelines so they understand how long ago the civilisation was, they have used computers and books to research Ancient Egyptian gods to discover how important they were, and the children have even written their names in hieroglyphics! The children showed off their understanding of hieroglyphics and their art skills on our visit to the British Museum.

Our book in English is called Marcy and the Riddle of the Sphinx, where the protagonist goes on a quest to save her father! The children have been incredibly creative in their predictions about what will happen in the story, demonstrating their fantastic acting skills by imagining they were retelling the story so far, and even designed their own mythical map for Marcy's route to Egypt.













A snapshot of The Orchard



We have really enjoyed settling in the new learners to the Orchard and welcoming back familiar faces. We were excited as Lewis joined the Orchard Team along with some new little learners and their parents! This additional Orchard Classroom has been a great success and the whole school has enjoyed watching the Orchard grow. After a settling in period at the beginning of the year, we have thrown ourselves into learning and embedded some new routines. All three Orchard classrooms have been enjoying Wake and Shake daily which is a great opportunity for the whole provision to come together. Friendships have been made amongst the children and we have really enjoyed getting to know all the adults that work alongside us, even those in our mainstream link classrooms. Please read the summaries below to find out what each class has been up to.

Orchard 3: Our eldest learners have thoroughly enjoyed the move to the third floor and are relishing the opportunity of being so close to their link classes in Learning Zone 2. We started the year learning about Fairy Tales and put on a brilliant performance of the Three Little Pigs for Mr Mannix and Mr Simon who highlighted how impressed they were with the children's story telling skills. Following this, we learnt about a range of other fairy tales and really enjoyed the exciting objects that accompanied this learning from the story box. Our favourite part has to be when we dressed up as the troll to role play 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' - we were brilliant and very humorous trolls. In Science, we have been investigating all things 'Materials' and conducted some fascinating experiments that helped us to identify different properties. During Maths lessons, we have all enjoyed working on our own specific targets and continue to make great progress. We have continued to enjoy horse riding at the Barracks at Hyde Park. As we have been attending these sessions for over a year now, we really are the experts and enjoy setting a great example to Orchard 2.

Orchard 2: Our learners in Orchard 2 experienced lots of change this year with Melissa moving on to help children elsewhere. Although we do miss her, we are so happy to welcome our newest member of the teaching team Lewis! We have really enjoyed getting to know Lewis and allowing him to get to know all our unique personalities. We have also been learning all about different fairytales and really enjoyed the latest half term topic of 'Paws and Claws'. Using our artistic and creative skills, we created animals from a variety of different mediums which can be seen on show within our Classroom. Similarly, we have really enjoyed engaging in messy play, cooking and trips to the sensory room. We have really been able to explore our own special interests this term and as a result we have heard lots about the Lion King, creatures, baking cakes and have all helped take care of the class baby. Just like Orchard 3, we have been completing our Maths learning attributed to our individual levels and some of us have really enjoyed our trips to the Hyde Park Barracks for Horse riding. Some members of the class have been enjoying inclusion with their link class and many of us have been joining the rest of the school for playtime and lunchtime.

Orchard 1: Our youngest learners in Orchard 1 have been very busy settling in to new routines. They have made brilliant relationships with the adults in their class and equally have enjoyed becoming more familiar with the other children. We have had a wonderful time getting to know Agustin and wish him all the best as he embarks on a new adventure in Sweden. As a result, we will be welcoming a new member of staff into Orchard whose name is Jordan. Jordan is very excited to get to know all of the children and adults in Orchard much better in the coming weeks. At learning time, we have also really enjoyed exploring fairytales and especially liked 'Goldilocks and The Three Bears' and 'Stick Man'. We have also enjoyed lots of art lessons surrounding our story books and have created some impressive outcomes that are also on display within our room and in our scrap books. Some of us have been partaking in inclusion and have enjoyed getting to know our link classes on school trips. Three of our learners went with their parents and Chelsea to the lyric theatre and the other three children are heading to London Zoo next week.

We look forward to all coming together at some point before the end of term to offer parents the opportunity to meet Jordan.

Well done to our amazing Orchard Learners!

































































































































































Adaptation at Barlby




At Barlby, we strive to create a learning environment that is accessible and appropriate for all. We believe that a true model of inclusivity does not just exist within classrooms but must be present in all aspects of school life and we proudly embed these values across our school in our culture, policies and teaching. The culture we have fostered is one built around the principle of all children and families feeling a sense of community or belonging whilst also promoting ambitious but purposeful outcomes for a variety of different learning styles.

Primarily, we have crafted inclusive environments, most notably our low arousal colour scheme that can be seen in the communal areas and the classrooms. Training has been delivered to optimise the outcomes of children with an additional need and the term 'transactional support' (which refers to any support used to aid a child in their learning or emotional regulation) has become part of our daily vocabulary. In collaboration with the Orchard, we have adopted great practise in terms of a 'sensory diet' and are able to draw upon this understanding for those who need an additional sensory focus to promote outcomes. This may be something as little as a movement break before we begin our Maths lesson but can make all the difference when preparing a child for a burst of learning.

Within the classrooms, our teaching staff have been collaborating to ensure that learning is adapted to cater for all children within the class. This adaptation does not just include catering for those who need a transactional support to aid in their attainment but also those who require conversations/tasks that extend their understanding. We are also using the 'Quality First Teaching Model' which helps teaching staff consider what universal, targeted and specific transactional supports are used within the classroom. When looking at universal supports, we are considering strategies we can adopt for every learner in the class to be inclusive and to further promote that sense of community and belonging referenced above. When looking at targeted support we are looking at any interventions or small group work a child may need to be referred to- this could be either to extend understanding or to address any misconceptions. Finally, when addressing specialist support, we are looking at drawing upon expert knowledge from external agencies and implementing their guidance and advice. We work very successfully with our external partners and really enjoy learning about any new strategies on offer. Most recently, we have been drawing from free training on offer from the Bi-borough Inclusive Service.



Admissions



The application deadline for **Reception places September 2024** is fast approaching. The deadline is **15th January 2024** and interested applicants need to apply through the local authority in which they live. Next year we will once again be offering 50 places- 25 in each Reception class.

We hold the waiting list for **Nursery places September 2024** and there are now just 13 places available as some Barlby families have already submitted their applications. Priority is given to the siblings of children already learning in our school. Application forms can be downloaded from the school website or collected from the office.

Secondary school places for Year 7 will be offered by local authorities in the first week of March 2024.



















































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Barlby's code of Conduct
